### Annual Meeting Christ Episcopal Church January 21, 2024

Ballots for Vestry were distributed as the congregation went to the Parish Hall for lunch and returned to the tellers to tally. When lunch had been served, Fr. Hal Weidman called the meeting to order.

Deacon Nancy Sartin opened the meeting with prayer.

Announcements included recognition of the Vestry candidates: Cliff Baker, Krystle Black, Merrill Guice, Becky Meadors, Ed Mistick, Sally Nunn, Kathleen Parsons, Don Thieme, and Bobby Yarbrough.

The outgoing members of the Vestry served as tellers to count the votes: Brad Burnette, Sandra Fletcher, Dottie Pitts and Al Turner.

The individuals responsible for the many ministries of Christ Church were listed and the Rector made remarks concerning the new beginnings that have been made in the past year. Attendance averaged 140 which is a return to pre-Covid numbers. Pledges for the coming year totaled \$509,000. More pledges can be expected. For the coming year, it will be important to build relationships, prepare for healing, experiment, explore, grow, and develop ministries.

The congregation was reminded to read The Good Life, the book the diocese as a whole is reading.

Stefani Carroll, Treasurer, reported that we ended 2023 with a slight surplus and that the 2024 budget had been adopted by the Vestry.

### Summary of 2024

Christ Church has several programs that support adult learning and faith formation. Two of these opportunities are off the church campus. Both were held at Tammy and Ron Borders' home. On Bible Study was led by Willa Valencia and the other was led by

Tammy. Chris Roan leads a study of the readings for the day on Sundays in the Parish Hall between the 8AM and 10AM services. Fr Hal mentors an Education for Ministry group on Monday evenings. This group consists of seven individuals studying on the seminary level.

Youth ministries are being led by Katie Wisenbaker and Ellie Copeland. Children's ministries have grown quite a bit this year. There have been a few changes. The nursery and chapel functions as a learning center for babies, toddlers and older elementary school aged children. The former nursery has been divided so babies and toddlers may play and explore safely. Older children nay go on to the chapel area and work with the materials that give them a hands-on experience. Some of the presentations or stories cover foundational stories of the old and new testaments. Other presentations explore liturgy, prophecy, geography of Israel and Jerusalem, biblical genealogy and the life of Jesus.

The old nursery has been painted, thanks to Steve Honeycutt and Stefani Carroll. Sunday morning teachers include Madison Edmondson, Cassidy Bradley, and Tobey Ellis (interns) and Kylee Creasy, Anne Turner, and Phyllis Heirs.

In the next year I hope to enhance the program for 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> graders. I would like to establish an art room and create a children's garden.

### **Report from College Ministry**

The college ministry serves college students including students attending Valdosta State University, Wiregrass Technical College, and Georgia Military College. Grace Cafe is open Monday through Thursday from 9 AM to 10 PM and Friday from 9 AM to 4 PM. Students have access to free coffee and snacks, a copier and printer, free wifi, a food pantry and two of the prettiest cats you've ever seen. Students are invited to a free dinner every other Thursday night at 7 PM. There is fun programming on the alternate Thursday nights as well. The college ministry is guided by a team of 9 parishioners who meet monthly to work with the director to interview prospective interns, provide insight and guidance.

This year we had a total of 12 interns throughout the year. We provide housing to our interns in exchange for 20 hours of work per week at the church and/or at Grace Cafe. One of our interns provided assistance to the preschool teachers several nights a week. Two of our interns helped Peggy Baer in the church office last semester. One intern helped the senior warden with buildings and grounds projects last semester. Two interns assisted the director in the weekly shopping trip to Second Harvest. One of our interns provided technical website and internet assistance on a weekly basis to the church.

Grace Cafe served a total of 5,361 students which is a 5% increase over last year. Grace Cafe hosted 16 dinners for students. There were also several events mostly held

on Thursday evenings. The Cafe hosted a Super Bowl party, art night, two knitting nights, a watermelon social, ice cream social, a few game nights, a pumpkin carving night, trivia night, karaoke, and a few football Saturdays.

The interns at Grace Cafe diligently serve students who experience significant food insecurity. The interns heavily rely on Second Harvest to provide fresh fruits and vegetables and nonperishable items to students as needed. The food pantry has been well used. The National Center for Education Statistics reports 35% of college students nationwide experience food insecurity. Another 13% experience homelessness.

Compline was held several times throughout the fall semester on Wednesdays at 7 PM at Grace Cafe.

During the summer months, interns who resided in Louttit Hall and Tomberlin House paid a \$200 per month fee to help offset the utilities. The interns who resided on our church campus were provided some fun opportunities such as cookouts, swim parties, blueberry picking, a visit to the Peach Shed, kayaking at Banks Lake, hiking at Reed Bingham State Park, fireworks at the mall, tubing at Ichetucknee Springs, and a day trip to Fernandina Beach. And thanks to the Yarbrough family, the interns had a retreat and training at Lake Blackshear where they enjoyed jet skis, swimming, boating and team building. The interns also worked for several parishioners during their time off this summer.

Our parish was quite generous to Grace Cafe through their donations of furniture, food, baked goods, household items, money, opportunities, and lots of encouragement.

### Activities this year

- Logo we designed and launched our new "little red church" Logo. Variations of the logo can be created for various applications (like the logo on this report). Let us know if you need a logo for your committee or event.
- Facebook/Instagram we maintained a presence on Facebook and Instagram.
   These posts are mostly after-the-event photos and are intended to help build our church community and enthusiasm.
- Friday Vineyard this is an important part of our overall communication plan. If you are not receiving the Friday Vineyard (via email), please contact the church office to sign-up for it. This year, we have worked on improving the Friday Vineyard to make it more relevant.

- Website we (i.e. Julius Ariail) worked hard to revisit/revise/update/improve our website. One of the interns, Solé Meighan, has helped us with posting items to our website and creating links for publishing in the Friday Vineyard.
- Church Calendar we researched and experimented with an online calendar.
   Although we made the decision to hold off on implementing this for now, we can use the knowledge we gained later if we decide to revisit it.

<u>Audio Control & Livestreaming</u> This is a sub-group of Media & Communications that manages audio and livestreaming for most worship services. Participants this year include Ken Rumstay, Tom Carroll, Glenn Flowers, Julius Arial and Larry Wisenbaker. We need more helpers - let us know if you are interested in joining our team.

- Audio management is as important for those attending in person as it is for those watching via livestream. We also have a hearing-assist system that automatically launches during system power up. Audio management involves setup/testing, muting/unmuting, volume adjustment and pack-up & shutdown after the service.
- We have successfully livestreamed every Sunday service during 2024 (all Sundays except for the Sunday after Helene), plus a few funerals and a few special services. We typically have 10-15 viewers on a given Sunday. We have parishioners who find this service to be extremely valuable to them.
- Viewership of the posted livestreams continues to increase after the event is over. Some of those are first time views, while others represent members rewatching announcements, sermons and/or special performances/events.
   Some use this as a method to "shop" for a church.
- We use a paid software/service (i.e. Streamyard) to produce the livestream feed and link the feed to Facebook and Youtube. Events are typically planned/scheduled several days before the event via Streamyard; Streamyard is web based so some of the work is completed from home by logging in over the internet.
- The primary ongoing cost for all the above is the annual subscription to Streamyard, which is about \$400/year. There is always the possibly of having to replace failed equipment - the biggest risk being the lapel microphones which run \$100-200 each. We also use the church's network system and WiFi.

Fr Hal's Annual Report to the Parish January 7, 2025

This year's report summarizes events during 2024. Unfortunately, it overlooks some events and people. This does not mean they were unimportant or unappreciated; it just means I wanted to keep my report to a reasonable length this year after the lengthy one in 2023.

The year began with 40 attending the Epiphany Pageant on January 6th. Especially entertaining were the three Kings played by dads.

During the Annual Meeting Cliff Baker, Becky Meadors, Ed Mistick and Bobby Yarbrough were elected to the Vestry Meeting.

The Vestry went on Retreat to Christ The King Episcopal Church in Valdosta for teambuilding and discussions about the upcoming year. Carey Wooten from Calvary, Americas facilitated the gathering. It was decided that Eric Laws' Respectful Communication Guidelines and Vesty Norms were created and agreed upon for our meetings. The concept of a Consent Agenda was also adopted. There was a lot of energy in planning for the year. It was agreed that each Vestry member would create 2-3 S.M.A.R.T. (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Relevant, and Time-Oriented) goals for the year. The Vestry as a whole would also create 2-3 goals for the year. It was also decided that the Vestry Member of the Day programs would return. All were encouraged to pray for each other and our ministries. The following ministry liaison assignments were made:

In preparation for Lent a Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper was held. Beginning with Ash Wednesday, evening Eucharists were celebrated along with talks given by me.

The Communications Committee rolled out a new logo for the Parish for the "Friday Vineyard" and church stationary. The website also underwent a substantial upgrade. Jeri-Lyn Flowers was hired as our new Director of the College Ministry and Frances Guice decided to step down as our Altar Guild Chair. I'm grateful for Frances' service and for Lucy Tomberlin for assuming this position last Spring.

Our full-time Administrator position was changed to a part-time Administrative Assistant position and after months of Merrill Guice and Rachel Rumstay volunteering in the office, Peggy Baer was hired for the staff position. I am grateful for Merrill and Rachel's service to this parish and I'm pleased to say that Peggy has been the right hire for Christ Church.

In preparation for Bp Frank's visit in April I led a "Welcome to the Episcopal Church" class. During Frank's visit, ten were confirmed, nine were received and one reaffirmed their faith.

In addition to special Holy Week services a Taizé service was held and well received. We joined Christ The King in the Easter Vigil at their place.

The Vestry reviewed the Privacy Policy and Conflict of Interest Forms to be signed by those requiring them. After hosting parish meetings to talk about security issues, it was decided that radios would be ordered for our ushers to use during the 10AM Sunday service. Endowment and Investment Fund Policies and Guidelines were approved. Two new office computers were approved for purchase.

During the summer, we assisted other area Episcopal churches in feeding healthcare workers who see migrant farm workers in our area. This event was held at Christ The King.

Molly Stevenson was one of Georgia's Deputies for General Convention in Louisville.

We also hosted a July 4th service where I preached, and Jim Elliott celebrated; 85 attended (68 in 2023).

Molly Stevenson was recommended to Bishop Frank to continue in the Ordination Process towards priesthood.

Our Preschool and PMO aides' pay was increased. \$251 was collected for ERD and \$275 was collected for UTO.

The bylaws were amended so business could be conducted via email if an important issue surfaced between meetings.

Ed Mistick, Sandy Sandbach, and Molly Stevenson were elected as our Delegates and Elise Sandbach, Paul Stevenson and Michelle Weidman were elected as our Alternates for Diocesan Convention in Tifton.

Safe Churches. Safe Communities training was emphasized throughout the year. The PMO/Preschool students and staff were welcomed back to school and the college students' electronic devices. Were blessed; devotions were given during both terms.

In the aftermath of Hurricane Helene and with the help of Julius Ariail, Peggy Baer, Larry Wisenbaker, and Bobby Yarbrough I sent messages to the parish encouraging prayer an offering support for those in need. Due to the hurricane, our stewardship campaign was delayed for two weeks. A need for a Disaster Relief Plan surfaced. Work continues on this led by Mike Tanner.

Hours for individuals to "drop in" my office to chat were published (Tuesday and Thursday, 10-12). Appointments are encouraged.

We hosted a listening session for our Convocation for discussions about diocesan Strategic Planning.

Talks on Henry Nouwen's Spirituality of Fundraising and Celtic Spirituality were given. We celebrated Elise Sandbach's 30+ years of service to our Preschool and enjoyed a parish picnic and Trunk and Treats.

In October, the Vestries of the Valdosta area Episcopal Churches met to talk about where we might join together on various ministries. We will meet again during Lent.

Towards the end of the year a Mutual Ministry Review was conducted with the results sent to Canon Lasch.

Holy Eucharist was celebrated at Holy Trinity in Blakely by me since they haven't had a priest visit them in two years.

During November we hosted a party to watch the Investiture of Bp Sean Rowe to Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church, a group of men attended a VSU football game, and a Thanksgiving Eucharist with area Episcopal Churches was hosted by St Barnabas.

On Christmas Eve 159 attended our Children's Service with 109 being here for the late service.

Our average Sunday attendance for 2024 was 152, a 7.8% increase from 2023.

It was a pleasure and honor to serve Christ with our families and friends this year. I believe we are doing God's will in continuing to be more efficient in how we do business, more spirit-filled in how we worship, more joyful in how we lead our children and youth, and more pastoral in how we treat each other, both members of this parish and beyond. I look forward to another outstanding year at Christ Church during 2025.

Following are some of the accomplishments of your Vestry as a whole during 2024 -

- Goals were established during the Vestry Retreat in February

- There has been further relationship-building between the local Episcopal churches
- Security was discussed at parish-wide forums
- Monthly Birthday/Anniversary recognition and prayers was reinstituted the first Sundays of the month
- Our communications team created and implemented the use of a new logo
- Hosted one of the Diocesan Strategic Planning sessions
- Hosted a "watch party" for the Presiding Bishop Consecration
- Goals for 2025 will include –
- Continued steps toward better communication accurate and timely
- 100% compliance with the new Safe Churches/Safe Communities requirements

### Recap of 2024/Goals for 2025

- The safety of our staff and Parishioners was our number one goal in 2024. These are some of the accomplishments in 2024 that have improved our safety program.
- Installed three AEDs (Automatic External Defibrillator). One is in the Parish Hall, hallway of the office and in the hallway of the Gabbard Building.
- Purchased four, two- way radios to increase responds time in the event of an emergency. Ushers carry the radios, and one is used by the nursery personnel on Sundays and is very helpful to our preschool as well. All provide constant communication.
- The door to the kitchen and the Gabbard Building are locked during services on Sundays.
- Installed Ring doorbells at The Tomberlin House and Grace Café.
- Installed Ring solar camera to observe entry into the office area, back door of the kitchen and the parking lot behind the church.
- Installed safety railings in the Nave to reduce the risk of trips and falls and prevent chairs from flipping over.
- Repaired lighting throughout the property.
- Reduce utility costs and be more energy efficient:
- Installed new roof and the furnace downstairs at Grace Café.
- Installed energy efficiency programable thermostats at the Tomberlin House, Grace Café and the Parish Hall.
- Repaired old cast iron sewage line in Grace Cafe, reducing plumbing issues.
- Installed vapor barriers, air vents and fans to improve ventilation under all buildings, decreasing condensation reducing the chance of termites.
- Repaired numerous leaks in the roofs
- Repaired breaks in the irrigation system resulting in a decrease in water cost.
- Throughout the year we experienced mostly plumbing issues, leaky faucets, clogged toilets and sewage backups.
- We experienced constant leaks in our roofs throughout the property.
- Heating and air conditioning issues was our major challenge during 2024.
- Goals we need to accomplish in 2025:
- Repair or replace roofs on the Parish Hall, behind the church, breezeway and the office. Keep roofs free of debris.
- We are in the process of ordering pew cushions for the church. The order will be placed prior to the end of January and should arrive at the end of March.
- Continue to pursue a local architect to provide the cost for constructing a structure over the playground at the school and out to the load/unloading of the children. This will replace the damaged canopies currently used. This application is not sustainable and will continue to be very expensive with constant repairs.

- Order more outdoor surveillance cameras to continue to improve the safety of everyone on campus. Consider other means that will ensure the safety of all.
- Continue to research installing a Generac generator at the Rectory. The main concern is, if power is lost, the sum pump in the basement will not work and water will fill the basement. The current estimate is \$15,000.
- Continue to replace outdated lightening with LED efficient lights.
- Sign service contract with air condition company to provide preventive
  maintenance and replace a/c filters throughout the campus. This will reduce wear
  and tear on the units and will reduce utility costs. We currently have received an
  estimate from Bone Heating and Air, the cost is \$2,700.
- Utilizes is one of our most expensive ongoing expenses. We need to continue to pursue all available means to be more efficient and save.
- As you know, in 2023 and again in 2024 we experienced a hurricane each year
  resulting in damage to our campus. Fortunately for us, we received substantial
  dollars from the insurance company to make necessary repairs, which we did as
  needed. However, after making the repairs we had dollars remaining that has
  helped positioned us financially, in a big way. However, this is something that will
  not, and thank God, occur every year and is something we can not count on. We
  have to all work together to reduce utility and become as energy efficient as
  possible.





# 2024 End-of-Year Totals by Category




